
FLC COURSE ENROLLMENTS - FALL 2019




STUDENT SUCCESS AND RETENTION RATES FOR FLC

Advanced Education students are significantly more likely to remain enrolled in a course throughout the semester (retention rate) than the overall FLC student body (average of 97% vs. 86%). Advanced Ed. students are also much more likely than the average FLC student to successfully complete their course with a passing grade (avg. 94% vs. 74%).

- 4. IF APPROVED: Register in person at FLC, EDC, or RCC Admissions w/photo ID.
- **5. PAY FEES:** At the time of registration or in eServices.




Tips for High School Sophomores

- Review your four-year academic plan with your parents/guardians, teachers, and counselors (a-g)
- Prepare and register early for the PSAT (<u>khanacademy.org</u>)
- Set up accounts on <u>collegeboard.org</u> (SAT preparation) and <u>californiacolleges.edu</u> (research colleges)
- Explore summer jobs, academic enrichment and volunteer opportunities, and summer college courses
- Meet with your school counselor to discuss junior year coursework, especially AP and honors courses

Tips for High School Juniors

- Sign up to take the PSAT in October
- Register for the spring SAT with Essay and/or ACT with Writing 6-8 weeks ahead (practice tests available on College Board)
- Research and tour colleges
- Learn the admission requirements of colleges you're interested in
- Prepare early for the May AP exams
- Familiarize yourself with the costs of college: tuition, fees, housing, food and supplies
- Students who plan to participate in Division I or II college sports should register with the NCAA Eligibility Center in the summer of junior year





ACT and SAT important information

- All colleges accept the ACT and SAT
- •Standardized testing is the second most important factor for college admission (after your academic transcript)
- •Most students take the ACT or SAT 2 or 3 times, with the majority of students scoring higher the second time they take the exams
- •Students should aim to finish standardized testing by the end of junior year
- •The ACT and SAT are different from the tests students are used to in several significant ways




